



Elections for the following posts in Executive Council will be held during the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Bombay Orthopaedic Society (BOS) on **Sunday, March 22, 2026 at Meeting Room No. 206 A & B, Jio World Convention Centre, BKC, Mumbai.**

- **PRESIDENT ELECT: 1 Post - Vacant**  
(1-year term; Dr. Gautam Zaveri will be Immediate Past President from April 1, 2026 and Dr. Samir Dalvie takes over as President on April 1, 2026)
- **VICE-PRESIDENT: 1 Post - Vacant**  
(1-year term; Dr. Sudhir Sharan completes his term and is not eligible for re-election)
- **HON. SECRETARY: 1 Post - Vacant**  
(2 years term (2026-2028); Dr. Ashish Phadnis completes his term and is not eligible for re-election)
- **MEMBERS OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL: 2 Posts - Vacant**  
(3-year term; Dr. Chasanal Rathod & Dr. Parag Lad retire after completing 3 years in the Council and are not eligible for re-election)

Members desirous of contesting the election to these posts should complete a nomination form and return it to the Hon. Secretary, at the Society's Office on or before 5.00 pm on March 7, 2026.

A member may apply for only ONE post.

A copy of the nomination form may be obtained from BOS office.

Last date to withdraw nomination is March 14, 2026 by 5.00 pm.

Emailed nomination forms or Digital format will NOT be accepted. BOS does not take the responsibility for any postal/courier delays. In the event that the number of applying candidates is same as the number of vacant posts, there will be no election.

The candidates are expected to adhere to a high moral code of conduct.

Executive Council has appointed Dr. Mohan Desai as The Chief Election Officer

All applications will be scrutinized by him in consultation with the President and the Secretary. Other rules governing the election process are mentioned below.

## ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ABOVE POSTS AS PER BOS CONSTITUTION

**All Members other than Overseas Members, in other words Life Members and only those with at least 5 years standing as a Member. The office bearers and members of the council shall only be those, whose addresses are registered with the office of the BOS as residents of Mumbai, Thane or Navi Mumbai region.**

**President-Elect:** A candidate should be a member of BOS for a minimum period of 10 years. Further, he should have served the BOS as an Executive Council Member for a minimum period of 3 years.

**Vice-President:** A candidate should be a member of BOS for a minimum period of 7 years. Further, he should have served the BOS as an Executive Council Member for a minimum period of 3 years.


**Hon. Secretary:** A candidate should be a member of BOS for a minimum period of 5 years. Further, he should have served the BOS as an Executive Council Member for a minimum period of 3 years.

## FROM THE DESK OF HON. PRESIDENT



Dear Fellow BOS Members,

Serving as President during the Diamond Jubilee year of the Bombay Orthopaedic Society was both an honour and a responsibility. An honour, because I was deeply conscious of its rich legacy of learning, leadership and service. A responsibility, because I was acutely aware that we are merely custodians of this legacy, entrusted to preserve its values and pass it on richer and stronger to the next generation.

The core strength of BOS has always been the Knowledge, Experience and Expertise within our membership which has enabled us to deliver academic programs of high quality. Our willingness to share freely and ability to express clearly has made academic programs organized by BOS, much sought after. With the goal of strengthening the BOS brand, in 2025, we launched BOS Worldwide - an initiative, under the umbrella of which we aimed to strengthen existing BOS academic programs and launch new ones that would help build bridges with organizations within India and across the globe.

57 BOS events were held between April 1, 2025 to March 30, 2026. These included 6 clinical meetings, 6 master series programs, 9 courses, 6 postgraduate teaching programs, 12 worldwide webinars, 10 outreach programs, 3 BOS sessions in state / national conferences, 4 live surgery symposia, and WIROC 2025. Additionally, the BOS conducted 4 short term (1 month) fellowships and released six BOS Masterseries Monographs. Details regarding these programs are provided in the Secretarial report.

### Academic Programs

1. The KV Chaulal Clinical Meeting has been a long and proud BOS tradition. However, in recent years it had seen dwindling attendance. In order to rejuvenate the meeting, we tried a new format where breakout subspecialty case discussions were held post the coffee break. Some of the meetings also saw afternoon teaching sessions targeting post graduates. These measures resulted in improved attendance. The EC recommends that at least 3 of the 6 clinical meetings should be conducted using the new format, subject to logistics at the host institution. My special thanks to all the conveners – Dr. R. Khandelwal & Dr. J. Baviskar (Nair Hospital), Dr. P. Munshi & Dr. V. Kundnani (Bombay Hospital), Dr. A. Goregaonkar & Dr. A. Kale (Sion Hospital), Dr. S. Agarwala & Dr. S. Dalvie (Hinduja Hospital), Dr. V. Bagaria & Dr. S. Keny (Reliance Foundation Hospital) & Dr. A. Sharma (Railway Hospital).

2. The bimonthly LN Vora Master Series symposia have always been well-conducted and well- attended. Under the stewardship of Vice President, Dr. Sudhir Sharan, 2025-26 also witnessed excellent programs with attendances ranging from 90- 150. The symposia are available as a link provided on the BOS website. I thank the conveners – Dr. S. Shahane & Dr. G. Dewnany (Nanavati Hospital), Dr. V. Agashe & Dr. S. Gawhale (Saifee Hospital), Dr. M. Desai & Dr. P. Nemade (KEM Hospital), Dr. A. Phadnis (Jupiter Hospital), Dr. A. Nene & Dr. P. Patel (Lilavati Hospital), and Dr. D. Pardiwala (Kokilaben Ambani Hopital).

3. The BOS courses which were in demand at one time, had seen a steady decline in attendance over the past few years. This was probably a reflection of numerous similar courses being held across the country. In order to provide delegates with a unique BOS experience, we reverted to the older 7-day format for all basic courses. This would involve cadaver and sawbone workshops, live surgery symposia, visits to the operation

theatre of leading BOS surgeons, lectures and case discussions. This format provided a wider and more comprehensive experience to participants, which made them feel empowered to practice what they had learned over the week. The EC recommends that the basic spine, trauma, arthroplasty and arthroscopy should be held every year over 7 days. Selected advanced courses could be conducted over a shorter duration of 3 days. I thank all the course conveners for their hard work and dedication to BOS - Hand (Dr. P. Lad, Dr. P. Kamble, Dr. K. Ladkat), Arthroplasty (Dr. A. Kale, Dr. A. Phadnis, Dr. G. Kanade), Arthroscopy (Dr. S. Biraris), Trauma (Dr. S. Kale, Dr. A. Kale, Dr. S. Purohit), Paediatric Orthopaedics (Dr. B. Sheth, Dr. A. Shah, Dr. C. Doshi), Deformity (Dr. M. Parihar, Dr. D. Ahuja, Dr. A. Chalak), Shoulder & Elbow (Dr. H. Argekar, Dr. S. Mutha), Spine (Dr. S. Shah & Dr. J. Jagiasi) and Ankle-foot course (Dr. P. Moonot, Dr. D. Sangoi & Dr. S. Thakkar)

4. Thanks to the dedication of Dr. B. Sheth & Dr. A. R. Karkhanis, the 6 JC Taraporewala Postgraduate Teaching Programs held at Sion Hospital were a runaway success with around 100 PGs in attendance.

5. WIROC 2025 - the Never Before WIROC, was an unqualified success with close to 1700 registration, 410 residential rooms and 5 packed halls. In addition to a highly interactive academic program, WIROC 2025 saw a tech corridor, 8 masterclasses, 4 cadaver workshops, 2 boot camps, a sawbone shoulder arthroplasty workshop and a vibrant social program. The Museum of BOS History, the BOS lounge, the Khau Galli were some of the other highlights. Kudos to Dr. P. Lad and Dr. C. Rathod for pulling off this miracle.

6. In 2025, the BOS provided 3 short term fellowships (spine, arthroplasty, and paediatric orthopaedics). We are hoping to increase the number of BOS fellowships, formalize and strengthen the program further over the next few years. We thank the mentors Dr. M. Desai, Dr. R. Mehta, Dr. T. Nagda and Dr. T. Rathod.

Under the banner of BOS Worldwide, the EC introduced a number of new academic initiatives that aimed to strength the BOS brand within India and abroad.

7. 12 worldwide webinars were successfully held over the year in collaboration with societies across the globe. This enabled us to forge long term exchanges with organizations such as SICOT, Asia Pacific Ankle-Foot Society, Australian Elbow Society, etc. My gratitude to the conveners – Dr. A. Puri, Dr. R. Mehta, Dr. R. Shah, Dr. P. Lad, Dr. V. Agashe, Dr. S. Dalvie, Dr. S. Mohanty, Dr. A. Pispati, Dr. P. Bhagunde, Dr. P. Kamble, Dr. A. Phadnis who made these events a grand success. A special thanks to the coordinators of this program – Dr. R. Mehta, Dr. J. Baviskar, Dr. N. Bijlani and the Ortho TV team.

8. During 2025-26, BOS members travelled the length and breadth of the country for the BOS Outreach programs that were held in Bhubaneswar, Aurangabad, Nanded, Vapi, Rajkot, Ranchi, Udaipur, Indore, Nasik. BOS sessions were also part of the MPOACON in Jabalpur, TRAUMACON in Mumbai, and MOACON in Pune.

9. Four re-live surgery symposia coordinated by BOS Secretary, Dr. Ashish Phadnis were held at the Jupiter Hospital in Mumbai over the year. These symposia were witnessed not only by about 100 delegates seated in Jupiter, but also telecast to over 15 cities across India, from where delegates had a live interaction with the presenters. I thank Dr. P. Lad, Dr. R. Shah, Dr. B. Sheth and Dr. H. Argekar for convening these programs. This effort also enabled us to create a BOS Video Library which is available online on the BOS YouTube Channel.

10. A major achievement this year has been the compilation and publication of six high quality books titled, "The BOS MasterSeries Monographs", a first for the society in its long and rich history. I thank all the contributors and the section editors – Dr. A. Puri & Dr. M. Pruthi (Giant cell tumors of bone), Dr. T. Nagda & Dr. B. Sheth (Paediatric Elbow Fractures), Dr. V. Shetty & Dr. S. Gawhale (Tibial condyle fractures), Dr. D. Pardiwala & Dr. S. Mohanty (Osteoarthritis Knees), Dr. D. Sahu, Dr. P. Lad & Dr. P. Kamble (Failed upper limb fixation) and Dr. H. Argekar, Dr. S. Kale & Dr. S. Bhonsle (Failed lower limb fixation).

## **Social Programs**

In this, the diamond jubilee year of the BOS, I intentionally prioritized social programmes with a view to foster trust, strengthen collaboration, and deepen mutual respect among members. I strongly believe that strong professional bodies are built not only in boardrooms but also through meaningful personal connections.

The BOS Monsoon Picnic to Karjat, attended by about 40 members was full of fun and frolic. It created a relaxed environment where members could interact informally to build authentic relationships. The BOS Sports Day held at the Prabodhan Thackeray Krida Sankool, Vile Parle saw 150 BOS members participating in cricket, table tennis, pickle ball,

rifle shooting, football and carrom. The event promoted teamwork, wellness, and camaraderie through friendly competition. A Walk Down Memory Lane was a specially curated event held at the MCA Club, that provided a reflective platform to celebrate our shared history and collective achievements, reinforcing our identity as a unified body. Finally, the Presidential Dinner held at the Jade Garden Hotel, Worli, brought members together in an atmosphere of appreciation and fellowship, strengthening bonds that ultimately enhance our professional effectiveness. I strongly urge future BOS Presidents to start the tradition of an annual contributory dinner to further fellowship and bonding within its membership.

In order to encourage healthy living and participation in sports, we have initiated the BOS Awards for Sporting Excellence to be given to BOS members with outstanding achievements in sports within the year. For 2025- 2026, the awards went to Dr. K. Karkera, Dr. A. Joshi, Dr. D. Pardiwala, Dr. S. Dhone, Dr Z. Sorathia and Dr. T. Prabho.

In the same vein, we have decided to recognize outstanding contributions in social welfare and community development through the BOS Humanitarian Awards.

### **BOS History Project**

The BOS History Project was a landmark initiative celebrating our legacy and preserving it for future generations. At WIROC 2025, we curated and launched the BOS Museum and Photo gallery, showcasing milestones, leadership journeys, and transformative initiatives that have shaped our organisation. This physical exhibit generated immense interest and engagement among members. Simultaneously, we established an Online Museum of BOS History, creating a permanent digital archive accessible to members across geographies. The project culminated in the compilation and release of the commemorative book, Aarohan, documenting the rich history, achievements, and evolution of BOS, ensuring our journey continues to inspire generations ahead.

I would like to thank Dr. Taral Nagda, Dr. Swapnil Keny, Dr. Sushant Srivastava & Dr. Agnivesh Tikoo for their extraordinary efforts in seeing this project through.

## FROM THE DESK OF HON. SECRETARY



Warm greetings from the Office of the Secretary, Bombay Orthopaedic Society.

As we step into the seventh decade of our Society's existence, having just concluded our Diamond Jubilee year, we find ourselves reflecting not only on a rich and illustrious legacy but also on the responsibility of shaping a dynamic and forward-looking future. The Jubilee year was not merely celebratory; it was transformative. It marked the consolidation of our core strengths while catalysing new initiatives that expand our academic, geographic, and professional horizons.

The academic calendar this year has been exceptionally vibrant, with more than fifty programmes conducted under the BOS banner. Alongside our established flagship activities, we introduced several initiatives that are poised to become defining features of the Society's academic identity. The clinical meetings began the year on an energetic and innovative note, with the introduction of subspecialty-focused and thematic discussions as structured extensions of the traditional clinical format. Centres with the requisite logistical support embraced the concept enthusiastically, resulting in improved audience engagement, richer deliberations, and heightened academic participation.

The Master Series programme, ably convened by Dr. Sudhir Sharan, continued to command attention and respect. This year, there was a deliberate emphasis on case-based illustration of trauma fixation strategies and failed fixations, perioperative management, spine infections, and orthopaedic sports injuries. The sessions were academically rigorous yet clinically relevant, and the continued viewership of the recordings on our YouTube platform reflects the sustained value they provide to members and the wider orthopaedic community.

Beyond academics, we recognised the importance of fraternity and camaraderie. The BOS Monsoon Picnic to Karjat was a refreshing interlude in an otherwise intense year. The overnight programme at the Radisson Blu allowed members to unwind, reconnect, and celebrate the spirit of togetherness that defines our Society.

In keeping with the vision articulated by our President during this Diamond Jubilee year - that the BOS must continue to lead from the front - we undertook several novel and path-breaking initiatives. The BOS Outreach Programme extended our academic footprint to tier-2 cities in collaboration with local host societies. These engagements were not symbolic visits but meaningful CME and training initiatives, reinforcing BOS as a national academic leader.

The BOS Worldwide Webinars have been another milestone. Over the course of the year, we conducted twelve international webinars in collaboration with global societies and faculty from across continents. The breadth of subjects - from paediatric hip disorders and musculoskeletal infections to complex small joint reconstruction, advanced arthroscopy, arthroplasty, and limb reconstruction - ensured that our members were exposed to contemporary global thought and best practices.

The BOS Re-Live Surgery Workshops represented a particularly challenging but rewarding endeavour. Identifying knowledge gaps, curating relevant procedures, standardising surgical videos into concise ten-minute modules, and conducting synchronised hybrid sessions with interactive two-way discussions required meticulous planning. The outcome, however, was an academically stimulating platform that

successfully bridged physical and virtual participation across centres nationwide.

Our flagship BOS Courses were comprehensively reimaged. Structured as week-long immersive programmes, they combined saw-bone workshops, cadaveric dissections, concept-driven lectures, and case-based discussions. A defining feature was the hospital observership component, where delegates scrubbed in with senior surgeons during live surgical sessions. This hands-on exposure and one-to-one interaction were deeply appreciated and widely regarded as transformative learning experiences.

Encouraging young orthopaedic talent remains central to our mission, The BOS Student of the Year and Rising Star initiatives saw enthusiastic participation from teaching institutions across Mumbai. With 54 registrations for the Rising Star, conducted in three rigorous phases, the response was heartening. We were delighted to witness the competitive academic spirit and institutional pride these events evoked.

The BOS Fellowship programme also expanded meaningfully this year. Building on the success of the Robotic Arthroplasty Fellowship, we introduced fellowships in Paediatric Orthopaedics and Spine. Applications underwent stringent scrutiny and vetting. The selected fellows reflect both merit and commitment, and we intend to further expand the fellowship portfolio to include additional subspecialties such as hand surgery and arthroscopy in the coming year.

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly WIROC. Under the leadership of President Dr. Gautam Zaveri and the tireless efforts of the Organising Secretaries, Dr. Parag Lad and Dr. Chasanal Rathod, WIROC set new academic and organisational benchmarks. It was a congress that not only met expectations but surpassed them, reinforcing BOS's standing as a leader in orthopaedic education.

Institutionally, several processes within BOS have been streamlined, particularly in financial governance. Our Treasurer, Dr. Swapnil Keny, has worked with exceptional diligence to ensure transparency, compliance, and fiscal robustness. The Society's finances are now stronger and more systematically organised than ever before.

The effort to update our Directory in a rapidly evolving digital ecosystem encountered logistical and technological challenges. Nevertheless, Dr. Vidyanand Raut's perseverance has ensured significant progress, and with greater member participation, this initiative will soon reach fruition.

A proud milestone this year has been the DOAJ indexing of our Journal, made possible by the sustained and determined efforts of Dr. Sachin Kale and Dr. Ashok Shyam. Following indexing, we have already observed a tangible increase in both the volume and quality of manuscript submissions - an affirmation of our academic credibility.

Our media partners, Dr. Niraj Bijlani and Dr. Ashok Shyam of Ortho TV, along with our Webmaster, Dr. Agnivesh Tikoo, deserve special acknowledgment for ensuring high-quality dissemination of academic content, professional audiovisual standards, and consistent digital engagement across platforms.

On a personal note, serving as Secretary has been one of the most enriching experiences of my professional life. To have shared this journey with Dr. Mohan Desai, Dr. Samir Dalvie and Dr. Swapnil Keny, colleagues and mentors with whom I began my orthopaedic career in 1999 makes it even more meaningful. I remain deeply grateful to our President, Dr. Gautam Zaveri, whose vision, meticulous planning, and unwavering commitment have inspired the entire Executive Committee. His leadership has been both energising and exemplary and am proud to have watched it from closest quarters.

I extend my sincere gratitude to the entire Executive Council and to every member of the Bombay Orthopaedic Society for the trust, encouragement, and support extended to me during my tenure. If at the end of these two years the Society stands stronger, more cohesive, and more forward-looking than when we began, I would consider that the greatest professional satisfaction.

Long live the Bombay Orthopaedic Society.

# GUIDELINES FOR BOS COURSE CONVENERS

## ACADEMIC/ADMINISTRATIVE

1. Conducting a BOS course should be a privilege and all attempts should be made to uphold the reputation of BOS as an academic body while conducting these courses. The academic content and the faculty should be of the highest standard. The BOS Courses have been looked upon very favourably for the past 60 years and every convener should try and better the course content and delivery.
2. In keeping with the developments in various specialities of orthopaedics changing paradigms and concepts we understand the need to evolve and experiment with conduct of the course and delivery, we would like the conveners to share the ideas with the EC by the 15<sup>th</sup> of March 2026 upon allocation of the course or you may wish to do so at the time of application to support your case.
3. On allotment of the course the tentative program and the proposed faculty must be submitted to the Executive Council by the 15<sup>th</sup> of March 2026.
4. We encourage conveners to include faculty who are BOS Members and who will be able to give due commitments for the duration of the course. The BOS has some stellar faculty, steps must be taken to utilise them completely. Newer faculty may be introduced as table instructors or faculty in small group discussions with senior mentors.
5. The course content should be scientific relevant to the course and the experience of the delegates and based on evidence. Convener should ensure their faculty refrain from using eminence based or anecdotal examples.
6. The course should have a good mix of theory-based talks and lectures surgical case-based discussions and interaction with faculty in different hospitals in the form of surgeon visitations. The convener may approach the EC for help suggest centres and consultants for surgeon visitations, however the necessary permissions and formalities for surgeon visitation must be done before the course commences. Pre planning of the visitations will help the delegates in planning their stay and movement throughout the course.
7. If cadaver dissection is planned then liaising with the EC and other course conveners may help us stream line the courses their dates and explore the possibility of economising the expenses on the cadaver lab.
8. Industry participation may be encouraged for accessing instrument sets and sawbones. Due credit will be given to them where applicable.
9. Please plan the finances and logistics well as we want to ensure a smooth course without any burden to the convener or the BOS.
10. Certificate of participation signed by Convenor, President and Secretary as per the set format of BOS. If course accredited by MMC, MMC Observer sign will be required.
11. On the course banner, only the following names can be printed: Convenor, President and Secretary as per the set format of BOS. Any promotion of the course on social media must have aegis of BOS course written prominently.
12. It is preferable that application to MMC for Accreditation points to be done by Convener, if you need help from BOS Office, please obtain prior permission of the BOS Secretary to do so. It shall be the responsibility of the Convener to upload the attendance and comply with all the MMC requirements. Upload attendance within one week of completion of the course.
13. Please furnish a report of the course along with the bills within 15 days of completion of the course and a detailed report of the attendance and Delegate feedback. For the courses which are being held in November and December, the report to be submitted latest in 15 days after the course is over or by 15th December, whichever is earlier for publication in the annual report.

14. Selected candidates must be intimated timely as regards their selection and timings of the course, so that they can make their travel plans well in advance.
15. All due permissions from higher authorities in the respective institutions through HOD Orthopaedics and other allied departments, Dean permissions must be taken 2 months in advance, auditorium bookings etc. must be ensured to avoid last minute cancellations and embarrassment to BOS.
16. Courses, who do not receive at least 50 percent of applications 15 days prior to the event, may be scrapped if not viable. Due efforts must be made to popularise and advertise the courses if it is known prior that there are not enough applicants. At least one month prior to the event, the course quorum must be complete.
17. The convener may refer to a Case bank for taking clinical cases for discussion and acknowledge the source. He may also contribute to the faculty support packages by giving some of the PowerPoint slides of cases, PPTs of lectures as PDFs or handouts to the Secretary BOS for reference and use in the following years.
18. If a delegate is absent for the full course, you are expected to intimate the same immediately to BOS Office.
19. Bombay Orthopaedic Society is not responsible for any ill health or hospitalisation of delegates during the course, or any travel reimbursement of the same.
20. Please maintain good and efficient communication throughout the course with your delegates. You may add the BOS Secretary and Treasurer if forming a WhatsApp group. However, it is not acceptable to submit bills on WhatsApp. Physical copies are to be delivered to the Secretariat or scanned copies on e-mail with a detailed covering letter. BOS Office will not arrange for the collection of the same.
21. Feedback forms must be submitted online only. After verification of which the certificates will be issued to the delegates.
22. Delegates must be encouraged to be BOS Members and also encouraged to use the BOS Protocols App

#### **COLLECTION AND DISBURSING OF FUNDS FOR BOMBAY ORTHOPAEDIC SOCIETY COURSES**

1. The course fees should be in moderation. There is a GST of 18% on the course fees. There is a quantum of administrative charges, staff, banners, certificates, feedback, emailer and mass SMS (only 3 per course allowed). As a rough estimate, 25% of the course fees should be kept aside for above reasons and only balance 100 - 43 (18+25) 60 percent be spent. Amount Exceeding 60% of the collected revenue will not be sanctioned by the Executive Council under ANY circumstances.
2. It is desirable for the course to make a profit of at least 15% of the gross collection. Spending on faculty welfare is not allowed. Gifts to the faculty are NOT allowed. No mementos will be given to any faculty member during the course. Thank you letters to participating faculty as a courtesy must be arranged within 48 hours of the event.
3. The budget should be submitted before declaring as awarded in GBM; GBM should have only the list of decided courses with breakup of what the expenses are for. Any convener exceeding budget for 2-3 consecutive courses should be barred/fined.
4. BOS will not pay for instruments for any course as per AGM mandate. If instruments are taken on BOS name as a donation, prior intimation to the Secretary and Treasurer is mandatory. They need to be deposited at the end of the course within a week with a detailed list with the Treasurer, with an accompanying covering letter by the respective company.
5. Course dinner is not essential part of whole show. If planning it, make sure you are able to manage it within the budget allocated. Payment for catering bills should not be made in cash and Society is willing to issue a cheque in advance; money may also be paid by individual's credit card and Society will reimburse him by issuing a cheque. Personal Cheques and Credit Cards are acceptable mode - reimbursement by the Society is easy. For amounts more than Rs. 1,00,000/-, PAN card number of the payee is essential.
6. All sponsors must make their contribution to BOS; Sponsors of a BOS event should not give money directly to a Convener. It must come to Society's account and then spent for specified event. Sponsors are not expected to display their commercial visuals, banners etc. inside a meeting hall; all displays should be outside the meeting hall.

7. Payment in cash for bills higher than Rs. 30,000/- will not be allowed by the Executive Council as the Society cannot claim it as expenses. As internal policy, BOS wants to minimize spending in cash; such expense should only be for tips, and for small expenses lesser than Rs. 2,000/-.
8. If you need to pay any advance for conducting the course, please feel free to contact the Secretary or Treasurer at least 15 days prior to conducting course, we will make the arrangement for the same.
9. Please keep the expenditure within the total amount of course fees. If for some reasons you are likely to shoot the budget, you are requested to take prior permission from the BOS EC for the extra expenditure. Let the EC ratify / grant permission for the extra expenditure and then only go ahead with the same. For any special requirement, please submit prior quotation and justification and get it approved by the Secretary / Treasurer.
10. BOS will not pay rental charges to private clinics for the conduct of a course, implants for the patient, anaesthesia charges or consumables for the same.

## FLAGSHIP EVENTS OF BOS

1. a) **JCT Memorial PG Clinics:** Voucher payments for basic tea, coffee and refreshments will need the bill to Bombay Orthopaedic Society written clearly. Any other sundry minor expenses may be sanctioned with prior intimation to the BOS. If organising a lecture series, standard MMC application rules will apply.
2. b) **Clinical and Master Series meetings**
  1. The present expense limit for such events is Rs. 35,000/-. Part sum may be given in advance to the Convener in cash; as internal policy, BOS Wants to minimize spending in cash; such expense should only be for tips, and for small expenses lesser than Rs. 2,000/-. All food bills for various meets and courses should be paid by cheque; all caterers connected with Medical College canteens have PAN cards and can take cheques. Money can also be paid by individual's credit card and Society can reimburse him by issuing a cheque.
  2. All Clinical Meetings, Master Series and Course Conveners are expected to submit their accounts within 15 days of completion of their events along with the Convener's report. All such bills are checked and settled if found in order within 3 weeks of submission to Society's office. EC will take a serious note of late submission of expense sheet and course report; this may be taken against a Convener for future activities.
  3. Any payment made on behalf of BOS must be supported by an invoice (bill); for small amounts paid in cash it must be supported by a voucher signed by the concerned person. All bills must be collated and countersigned (approved) by the concerned conveners. Vendors are discouraged to submit the bills to Society's office. All these bills are seen and approved (signed in red) by the Hon. Treasurer before a cheque could be released. All cash expense vouchers should be countersigned by the Hon. Treasurer.
  4. Please furnish all the bills together bearing your signature after the course, so that payment can be done immediately at one instance. Please see that the payment is made by cheques as far as possible. Preferably 80% to 90% of payment should be done by Cheques. All expenses to be supported by bills and vouchers.

The revised academic structure incorporated specialty-based case discussions, record sessions, saw bone workshops and TLS demonstrations, along with structured postgraduate teaching modules. It is my sincere pleasure to present the report for the BOS Hand Course 2025.

Under the able leadership and guidance of the Hon. President of the Bombay Orthopaedic Society, Dr. Gautam Zaveri, we successfully conducted a 7-day course from 17th May to 23rd May at Pinnacle Orthocentre (Thane), Laud Clinic (Dadar), and K.E.M. Hospital (Parel).

As the Course Convener, along with Co-conveners Dr. Kiran Ladkat and Dr. Prashant Kamble, and with the support of senior faculty from Mumbai including Dr. Sudhir Warriar, Dr. Hemant Patankar, Dr. Pankaj Ahire, and Dr. Bipin Ghanghurde, we conducted around 30 live hand surgeries throughout the course.

This year, Day 2 of the course was made open and free for all BOS members, and was held at Hotel Fortune Lakecity, Jupiter Hospital Campus, Thane. The event was graciously sponsored by Intas Pharma (Gabapin NT division). On this day, we invited experienced BOS member hand surgeons from across Maharashtra to present and discuss pre-recorded hand surgeries.

In addition to the organizing team, Dr. Amit Varade, Dr. Ashok Ghodke, Dr. Nikita Shetty, and Dr. Rohan Habbu attended Day 2 in person and actively contributed to the demonstration and discussion. In total, 15 surgeries were reviewed and discussed that day.

The entire event was live-streamed to 15 centers across India via Zoom, facilitated by OrthoTV and Mr. Ivan Fernandes, who managed the audiovisual services for the entire course. This kind of national-level telecast was a first in BOS history, and it drew participation from approximately 800 orthopaedic surgeons from cities such as Sangli, Satara, Solapur, Agartala, Kanpur, Jalandhar, Coimbatore, Rohtak, Calicut, Tirupati, Haldwani, Bhatinda, Kozhikode, Patna, Kadapa, and Pondicherry. The event was a resounding success and received widespread appreciation from participants.

We had 14 delegates registered for the full course. Unfortunately, Dr. Bhunesh Mohpal from Siliguri cancelled a day prior to the course. Among the attendees were 5 non-BOS members, 4 BOS members, and 4 postgraduate orthopaedic students. We collected a total of ₹2,61,370/- (including GST) through registrations. One participant who withdrew due to international conflict (war-related issues) was refunded 50% of the registration fee.

I sincerely thank the BOS Executive Council for entrusting me with the responsibility of convening this course alongside my dedicated team.

## BASIC ARTHROPLASTY COURSE

The seven-day BOS Basic Arthroplasty Course was conducted from 12th to 18th July 2025 at Lokmanya Tilak Municipal Medical College (L.T.M.M.C.), Sion, Mumbai, in collaboration with Jupiter Hospital, Thane, and Apollo Hospital, Navi Mumbai. The course comprised multiple structured teaching modules designed to impart comprehensive and practical knowledge in the field of hip and knee arthroplasty.

The first day focused on building a strong foundation by addressing the core principles of primary hip and knee arthroplasty, while the second day was dedicated to the evaluation and management of primary complex hip and knee arthroplasty. Teaching methodologies included concept-based lectures, recorded surgical videos, and case-based panel discussions, ensuring effective coverage of key learning objectives.

A dedicated cadaveric workshop was conducted on the third day at L.T.M.M.C., providing delegates with valuable hands-on experience in performing primary hip and knee arthroplasty procedures.

Over the next three days, delegates attended morning operation theatre sessions at high-volume arthroplasty centres across Mumbai, Thane, and Navi Mumbai. Participants were divided into small groups and assigned to different hospitals, enabling close observation and active involvement in OT preparation, surgical execution, implant selection, and intra-operative decision-making related to primary hip and knee arthroplasty.

On the fourth and fifth days, afternoon academic sessions were held at Apollo Hospital, Navi Mumbai, featuring a hands-on dry bone workshop for total hip arthroplasty. In addition, breakout sessions were organised to facilitate one-to-one interactions and in-depth discussions between delegates and faculty members.

The sixth day featured an afternoon session at Jupiter Hospital, Thane, with a detailed focus on primary knee arthroplasty. Emphasis was placed on technical tips and surgical nuances, supported by structured training stations that addressed preoperative planning, bone cuts, and cementing techniques.

On the final day, the course concluded with concept-based lectures and case-based panel discussions on recent advances in hip and knee arthroplasty, held at the Department of Orthopaedics, L.T.M.M.C. A sawbone workshop was also organised, during which delegates practiced key surgical steps involved in hip and knee arthroplasty.

Several experienced arthroplasty surgeons contributed significantly as faculty members. All lectures, workshops, and teaching modules were conducted in physical mode. A total of 33 delegates from across the country actively participated throughout the seven-day course. Relevant and up-to-date arthroplasty literature was shared with participants. Overall, the course was comprehensively structured and successfully conducted, achieving its intended educational objectives.

# BASIC TRAUMA COURSE

## 1. Introduction

The Basic Trauma Course, conducted under the aegis of the Bombay Orthopaedic Society, was successfully held over 7 days from 12th to 18th September 2025. The course was conceptualised to provide a structured, comprehensive, and hands-on learning experience in orthopaedic trauma for postgraduate students and young orthopaedic surgeons.

The program combined evidence-based lectures, case-based discussions, surgical videos, saw bone workshops, cadaveric training, and observational postings across multiple high-volume trauma centres.

## 2. Course Objectives

The key objectives of the course were:

- To strengthen fundamental principles of fracture management
- To improve decision-making skills in trauma surgery
- To provide hands-on exposure to commonly used trauma implants and techniques
- To bridge the gap between theory and real-world trauma practice
- To expose delegates to complex trauma scenarios across all anatomical regions

## 3. Participation Details

- Total Delegates: 26
- Course Duration: 7 days
- Target Audience: Orthopaedic postgraduate students and early-career consultants
- Format: Hybrid learning with lectures, discussions, workshops, cadaveric lab, and hospital observerships

The limited number of delegates ensured high faculty–delegate interaction, effective mentoring, and personalised learning.

## 4. Venues

The course was conducted across multiple reputed institutions:

- L.T.M.M.C. & L.T.M.G.H, Sion, Mumbai
- D. Y. Patil Medical College, Nerul, Navi Mumbai
- Jupiter Hospital, Thane
- Apollo Hospital, C.B.D Belapur, Navi Mumbai
- Other associated trauma centres in Navi Mumbai

This multi-institutional format provided delegates exposure to diverse trauma management protocols and infrastructure.

## 5. Academic Structure and Day-wise Highlights

Day 1: Core Principles & Upper Limb Trauma

- Fundamentals of fracture fixation: absolute vs relative stability

- Failure analysis: biological and mechanical causes
- Trauma around wrist, forearm, shoulder, and elbow
- Extensive saw bone workshops including TBW, plating, PHILOS, distal humerus dual plating

#### Day 2: Paediatric Trauma, Pelvis, Knee & Complex Fractures

- Paediatric fracture management including NOF and supracondylar fractures
- Pelvic and acetabular trauma principles
- Knee injuries including tibial plateau and distal femur fractures
- Open fractures, pathological fractures, and periprosthetic fractures

#### Day 3: Surgical Approaches & Foot-Ankle Trauma

- Cadaveric training on upper and lower limb surgical approaches
- Foot and ankle trauma: Lisfranc, Chopart, calcaneum, talus fractures
- Saw bone workshops on calcaneal and ankle fixation

#### Days 4 to 7: Observerships, Case Discussions & Region-wise Trauma

- Delegates were posted to various trauma centres for real-time clinical exposure
- Focused afternoon sessions included:
  - Proximal and shaft humerus
  - Radius–ulna and distal radius fractures
  - Tibial shaft, plateau, and distal femur fractures
  - Proximal femur fractures including F.N.S. and intertrochanteric fractures
- Daily case-based discussions, decision-making algorithms, and hands-on workshops

### 6. Faculty Involvement

The course was supported by an eminent faculty panel comprising senior trauma surgeons, subspecialists, and experienced academicians from Mumbai and Navi Mumbai.

Faculty actively participated in:

- Interactive lectures
- Panel discussions
- Surgical video sessions
- Hands-on workshops
- One-to-one mentoring during observerships

### 7. Teaching Methodology

- Concept-based lectures
- Case-based panel discussions
- Surgical video analysis
- Saw bone fixation workshops
- Cadaveric dissection and approach training
- Live clinical exposure at trauma centres

This multimodal approach ensured holistic learning and skill development.

## 8. Delegate Feedback

Feedback from delegates was uniformly positive, with special appreciation for:

- Depth and breadth of trauma coverage
- High-quality hands-on workshops
- Faculty accessibility and mentorship
- Practical, decision-oriented discussions
- Exposure to real-life trauma workflows

Many delegates expressed that the course significantly improved their confidence in managing trauma cases independently.

## 9. Overall Outcome

The Basic Trauma Course 2025 achieved its intended academic objectives and was well received by participants and faculty alike. The course reinforced BOS's commitment to structured, high-quality trauma education and capacity building among young orthopaedic surgeons.

The course was designed to integrate structured academic teaching with hands-on workshops and real-time clinical exposure.

The program commenced with basic introductory lectures to establish core concepts in paediatric orthopaedics. This was followed by a structured combination of workshops, Live surgical demonstrations, re-live surgeries and interactive academic sessions delivered over the duration of the course. Highlight was the inclusion of the hands-on cadaveric workstations for the delegates.

We had five days of live surgical demonstrations with 25 surgeries demonstrated by our expert faculty at B. J. Wadia Children's Hospital, Jupiter Hospital, L.T.M.M.C, Sion and Bandra Bhabha Hospital

In addition, faculty members demonstrated and discussed 15 recorded surgical cases to enhance clinical reasoning, surgical planning, and decision-making which was streamed live across many cities throughout the country from event held on a Sunday, conducted at Jupiter Hospital, Thane.

The BOS Basic Paediatric Orthopaedics Course successfully achieved its academic objectives by delivering a balanced, high-quality educational experience combining lectures, workshops, and surgical exposure. The enthusiastic participation of delegates and the commitment of faculty contributed significantly to the overall success of the program. The course can be confidently regarded as a highly impactful and academically successful initiative under the Bombay Orthopaedic Society.

## SHOULDER & ELBOW COURSE

I, Dr. Harshad Argekar and my co-convener Dr. Satish Mutha have successfully completed the Shoulder & Elbow Course conducted under the aegis of the Bombay Orthopaedic Society from 17th January to 23rd January 2026. The course was meticulously designed to provide in-depth knowledge and hands-on experience to orthopaedic delegates in the area of shoulder and elbow surgery. A total of 8 delegates registered for the programme.

### Day 1: Lectures and Case Discussions at Cooper Hospital

The course commenced at Cooper Hospital with a series of didactic lectures and interactive case discussions. Renowned faculty members delivered comprehensive sessions covering recent advances, surgical techniques, and challenging cases in shoulder and elbow orthopaedics. Delegates actively participated in discussions, enriching their clinical acumen.

### Day 2: Live Surgeries at Jupiter Hospital

On the second day, the focus shifted to Jupiter Hospital, where delegates observed Live surgeries performed by expert surgeons. These real-time interactive surgical demonstrations provided practical insights into the nuances of shoulder and elbow surgeries. A total of 12 surgeries were shown to all delegates & were also beamed live to 11 centres all across India with active participation & interaction with orthopaedic surgeons from all over the country.

Day 3: The third day was hosted at Jaslok Hospital, featuring Dr. Prasad Bhagunde, who shared his expertise through detailed presentations and hands-on experiences with surgical cases. The evening session was held at H. N. Reliance Hospital, facilitating further exposure to complex cases and advanced instrumentation.

Day 4: Delegates returned to Cooper Hospital on the fourth day, where I, Dr. Harshad Argekar conducted

practical workshops and discussed innovative approaches in shoulder management. The sessions emphasised patient-centred care, clinical decision-making, and evidence-based practice. The evening session at Dr. R. N. Cooper Hospital was conducted by Dr. Satish Mutha. Here a focused discussion on elbow injuries was done, with various faculty participating actively.

Day 5: Day five included focused teachings and surgical demonstrations by Dr. Prashant Kamble at the K.E.M. Hospital. Delegates benefitted from his insights into challenging reconstructive procedures and postoperative protocols. Evening session was at Kokilaben Hospital under the guidance of Dr. Avinash Date.

Participants had the opportunity to observe rare and complex cases. Evening session in Dr. R.N. Cooper Hospital conducted by me focused on shoulder injuries with a special session with sawbones & hands-on workshop with Nail, Plate, Suture material including tightrope Interference screws & suture anchors.

Day 7: The final day took place at Wadia Children's Hospital, where paediatric shoulder and elbow disorders were the focus. Dr. Rujuta Mehta led the sessions, offering valuable perspectives on the management of congenital and acquired conditions in young patients.

Evening Case Discussions: Each evening, delegates engaged in one-on-one interactive case discussions with the faculty. These sessions were held at Cooper Hospital and other venues visited during the course, fostering a deeper understanding of case-based learning and encouraging direct interaction between faculty and participants.

## ILIZAROV COURSE

A comprehensive hands-on Ilizarov course was organised under the aegis of the BOS, at the Emerald Club, Chembur.

This time, we started advertising / publicising the course much in advance. The timing of the course at the end

of January was also good because all the "Big" conferences had finished and there was no other Ilizarov course held in proximity, so we could get a very large number of delegates. I would like to appreciate the H.O.D from J.J. Hospital, Dr. Nadir Shah, who made sure that the residents register for the course and learn. We had around 15 registrations from J. J. We had delegates from all parts of the country.

The course followed a well-established programme, teaching videos run before each workshop and the videos chunked into steps to make the concepts easier to understand and follow. The workshops were built to take the delegate through increasing levels of complexity so that they learn the principles of Ilizarov methodology and build a good basic knowledge of "what, when, where & how".

A clear learning outcome, "delegate will be able to apply a simple tibial frame or Alfa fixator for a tibial non-union, with confidence" and a course structured to meet that outcome, by way of (minimal) lectures, detailed hands-on sawbones workshops and case discussions, helped us to meet the goals of the course.

We provided the reading material related to the basic concepts, Atlas for transosseus fixation & safe zones as well as links for teaching videos and lectures on the same day of registration of the delegates on the BOS site. This gave them ample time to read and come prepared for the course and maximize their learnings.

The following workshops were done.

1. Wire passing and fixation
2. Basic Tibial Frame (Ilizarov)
3. Tibial Frame for Proximal / Distal Tibia
4. Tibial bone transport (Ilizarov)
5. ALFA fixator for tibia
6. ALFA fixator for femur
7. Demo of Deftfix Six Axis System

There were 12 workstations, with 4 delegates per workstation. On both days, we had 1 table instructor per workstation. Table instructors were surgeons who are regularly practicing Ilizarov surgery, and having prior training in Ilizarov surgery, having done 1 year fellowships previously.

The quorum was completed and the meeting was called to order by the President Dr. Mohan Desai and the meeting started at 9:30 a.m.

Dr. Ashish Phadnis welcomed everyone. Leave of absence was informed by Dr. Nicholas Antao.

## **AGENDA**

### **1. CONDOLENCES**

Dr. K. V. Chaubal passed away recently and there was a condolence meeting held for him during KEM Clinical Meeting. Dr. A. R. Karkhanis said that Dr. K. V. Chaubal used to come by Madras Mail to treat and operate polio patients near the Empire Cinema building and Roxy clinic, he used to operate scoliosis with Harrington rod. His technique of Bone grafting was so good that it used to be bloodless. He introduced me to the AK Henry textbook of Art of exposure. I attended all the clinical meetings whenever he was present and attained excellent knowledge due to his vast experience. He had impeccable bedside manners. Dr. Vikas Agashe said he remembered two things about Dr. K. V. Chaubal, the first that the X-rays should not be seen in the light of the view box but in the light of clinical finding. The second was 15 years ago at WIROC, he presented his work on fibula which is one of the best lectures he had heard about various treatment modalities involving fibula.

Dr. Telang said that he had initially joined as a registrar in general surgery. There was a vacancy in department of Orthopaedics where he was 1st in waiting list, after which Dr. K. V. Chaubal got his registration changed from surgery to Orthopaedics and he kept his word that he would allow Dr. Telang to join Orthopaedics if there is a vacancy. Dr. K. V. Chaubal was the respected personality and his first principle was to do no harm to the patient.

Dr. Khanna was of the opinion that the patient is King and used to spend around 30 minutes with each patient. Dr. Rakesh Bhansali passed away this year. Dr. Swapnil M. Keny said that he met Dr. Bhansali at HN Reliance Hospital. He was always very friendly and he made different blends of coffee at his place. He was jolly nice person and he contributed to BOS with his chapter on Dr. Rasik Bhansali, his father for the Legends and Legacy book.

Dr. A. J. Thakur said that this is the saddest year because we lost so many good Orthopaedic surgeons.

Dr. Ashok Motwani passed away this year. He practiced in Vashi area.

Dr. Vikas Agashe said that he was a jovial person and a great fighter and was always smiling when Dr. Vikas Agashe met him at Hinduja Hospital during his treatment.

Dr. Bipin Kamdar passed away this year. Dr. A. R. Karkhanis said that he was the registrar in KEM Hospital from 1975 to 1978 and had very good case presentation skills. He was first in MS amongst 27 students for that year. He had a Nursing Home on S V Road and had a very good smile. Dr. Vikas Agashe said that he was an MBBS from 1969 batch who had a great smile and was very particular about writing his notes and was a very good clinician.

Dr. Kusum Chandra Ambhure passed away this year. He graduated from KEM and practiced in Nerul area. Dr. Samir Dalvie said that he was an exceptionally soft-spoken person. He came from a family of faith healers and

had a huge line of patients waiting for him to be touched by him at the KEM OPD. He said he joined medicine because he wanted to see what science said about his ability. He was always smiling and a nice person.

## **4. PRESENTATION OF HON. SECRETARY'S REPORT: DR. ASHISH PHADNIS**

Dr. Ashish Phadnis presented his report where is emphasized on continuation of rich BOS legacy as we enter its 60th year. Keeping up with times and technology, he highlighted the increase presence and following on social media of various BOS activities including the BOS YouTube channel and Instagram page.

It was proposed by Dr. Vikas Agashe and seconded by Dr. Sachin Kale

## **5. PRESENTATION OF HON. TREASURER'S REPORT AND AUDITED STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR 2023-24 (MEMBERS ARE REQUESTED TO EMAIL THEIR QUERIES CORRECTION OUT OF MINUTES OF LAST AGM STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTS TO OUR BOS SECRETARIAT BY 8<sup>TH</sup> MARCH 2025 ON [secretary@bombayorth.com](mailto:secretary@bombayorth.com))**

Dr. Sangeet Gawhale enquired whether the donation was given to any religious place was tax free to which Dr. Satish Mutha answer that Rupees 2 lakh donation was given to Swaminarayan Temple as advice by last year's Presidential Guest Speaker Swami Gyanvatsal. The tax status of the donation is as per rules. There was one more query by him regarding expenditure of 1 crore 40 lacs in previous year as compared to 2 crore 8 lakh in this year mentioned on page 13. Dr. Satish Mutha replied that there are Rupees 10 lakh was spent for Protocol App, 15 lakhs for printing stationery and various courses advance tax and GST for WIROC which has been paid through the BOS account as of now. Dr. A. J. Thakur added that a note should have been added regarding the headings of various expenses in detail so that the members would know under what heading the expenses have been made. Dr. A. J. Thakur said that he has been receiving two or sometimes three copies of the AGM report. This occurs because the labelling has been outsourced to a third party, and the BOS should take an effort to

modify our list so that duplication is avoided. In terms of the printed calendar of events and the yearly planner, the yearly planner has no particular use as most of the people now prefer using their mobiles to add reminders for scheduled events. Dr. Rajesh Gandhi said that around 1,000 members have been added in the last few years since the BOS directory was updated. There is a need to streamline the members and update the directory. Dr. Gautam Zaveri said that he and Dr. Ashish Phadnis will update the directory in the current year. Dr. Gautam Zaveri commented that currently the design cost is also increasing and we are paying the designer on a case-to-case basis. We are reviewing the contract so that we can have annual contract to save expenditure. He also said that the number of messages for various courses is also increasing with time. Dr. V. T. Ingalthalikar said that 15 to 20% of the members might be digitally challenged, and he said that the yearly planner should still continue as it is a useful tool to plan for various BOS events. Dr. Samir Dalvie said that the expenditure is around 58 to 59 lakhs more in 2023-2024 statement, if we calculate net excess income over expense, 2023-2024 fares better with around 78 to 79 lakhs more in the year 2023-2024. Dr. Sangeet Gawhale suggested that the candidates who have recently contested the elections are the best to update the BOS directory as they will have the updated details of the members. Dr. Harshad Argekar said that the BOS directory was updated during his tenure and it was proposed to be updated every 5 years. Dr. Roshan Wade said that on page 15 the event expenses, the rent expenses and the professional fees details are higher in 2022-2023 year. Dr. Satish Mutha said that around 9 lakhs go to Vama Events, 2 lakhs to Dr. Ajit Deval for performance and rent of 70 lakhs for rooms and the Auditorium expenses for various courses is taken into account for these. He mentioned that the rent last year was 1 Crore 40 lakhs (2022-2023). Dr. Neeraj Bijlani said that for 2022-2023 Jio Convention Centre the rent included the hall rent and food rent while in hotel Westin there is no hall rent or room rent included. Dr. Roshan Wade said 2 crore 94 lakhs was spend for the event (2023-2024) and we should negotiate for better room, lunch and dinner rent. Dr. Satish Mutha said that at certain places, the food rent expense is lower but we usually take a package and the rates differ at different places. He said that room rent is different for different rooms at Jio Convention Centre while other places, we get a package. Dr. Gautam Zaveri said that we will ask the auditor to give a better breakup of the expenses from now on. Dr. Roshan Wade said that BOS should make more profit and it should not be event management driven. Dr. Samir Dalvie said that the event management companies control most of the hotels and they get better deals as compared to what we can negotiate. Dr. Samir Dalvie said that as long as the income is more than the expenses, we should not compromise on the academic and social components of the conference. Dr. Roshan Wade said that event management companies should not be making money from these conferences at our expense. Dr. Neeraj Bijlani said that there were seven halls in WIROC 2024 to which generator cost, construction cost, AC cost, extra hanger cost is added which makes conferences expensive. Dr. Gautam Zaveri said that the cost will be examined, and we will try and negotiate as much as possible. Dr. Vikas Agashe said that such a huge event is not possible to do without an event management company. Dr. Anil Karkhanis said that the events should generate profit because an organization cannot run without profit and is doomed to fail if it is not financially viable. Dr. Anil Karkhanis said that the forensic medicine also needs to be paid for the cadavers arranged during workshops. Dr. Rujuta Mehta said that these are audited accounts and this matter should now be taken with other matters at the end of the agenda. Dr. A. J. Thakur suggested that the major expenses should be given with proper division in the next year's account.

The Treasurer's report was proposed by Dr. A. J. Thakur and seconded by Dr. Vikas Agashe.

## **6. ALL PROGRAM STARTED BY PREVIOUS EC AND APPROVED BY GBM SHOULD BE CONTINUED AS A DUTY UNLESS APPROVED BY GBM FOR DISCONTINUATION**

The BOS Rising Star and Student of the Year is in its third year now. The proposal was to continue it for 5 years. We had 25 aspirants this year for the same. It was conducted by Dr. Sanjay Dhar. Dr. Sanjay Dhar will conduct these for next 2 years.

It was proposed by Dr. Rujuta Mehta and seconded by Dr. Vikas Agashe.

## **7. BOS ARTHROPLASTY FELLOWSHIP REPORT AND PROPOSAL TO EXPEND THE FELLOWSHIPS TO PAEDIATRIC ORTHOPEADICS AND SPINE SURGERY IN ADDITION TO ARTHROPLASTY**

The selection process was transparent and objective. We gave 10 points under various headings. Dr. Ankit

Vaghela was selected by this process. He did a six weeks fellowship which culminated in attending an Arthroplasty conference. Looking at the positive feedback the EC decided to add two more specialties to it. Dr. A. R. Karkhanis said that it should be a robotic arm assisted fellowship and that needs to be corrected in the minutes. For spine fellowship, the mentor will be Dr. Tushar Rathod. For Paediatric Orthopaedic fellowship, the mentor will be Dr. Chasanal Rathod. For Arthroplasty, the mentor will be Dr. Mohan Desai. The spine fellowship and Arthroplasty fellowship will be at KEM Hospital, while the Paediatric Orthopaedic fellowship will be divided between Wadia and SRCC Hospital. The fellowship will be of 4-week duration and fellows will be paid Rs. 50,000 each for accommodation and travel. In case there is difficulty in finding accommodation, Vama Events will coordinate with Catering College at Prabhadevi to provide accommodation at reasonable rates. Dr. Vikas Agashe ask if there was any rider before they get payment. The Secretary replied that they will be given the payment after 80% attendance, completing a logbook and writing a fellowship report. There has been a proposal to extend this fellowship by a further observership with an international society. It was proposed a fellowship committee be formed under Dr. Satish Mutha to formulate guidelines and coordinate with other international society for the same. Dr. Gautam Zaveri said that currently the master series was responsibility of the vice president. The president elect does not have an official responsibility. He can be a part of the fellowship committee. It was proposed by Dr. Rajesh Gandhi and seconded by Dr. Rujuta Mehta.

## **8. APPOINTMENT FOR THE AUDITOR 2025-2026**

Treasurer approved continuation of C. M. Gabhawala and Company. It was proposed by Dr. Sunil Shahane and seconded by Dr. Sachin Kale.

## **9. TO RATIFY THE CLINICAL MEETING DATES AND VENUE AS PER APPLICATION RECEIVED & TO DECLARE THE DR. P. M. MULLAFEROZE BEST CLINICAL MEETING AWARD FOR THE YEAR 2024-2025**

The clinical meeting schedule and dates are given below. Dr. V. T. Ingalthalikar said that clinical meeting started when Dr. K. V. Chaubal was Secretary and before the era of technology, were the best source of knowledge. Dr. Rajesh Gandhi suggested that JJ Hospital and other medical colleges should be included in the list. The Secretary informed that the previous GBM had decided to give clinical meetings in rotation to outside Institutes. Dr. Sangeet Gawhale said that 3-4 out of these meetings should be held in major teaching institutes. Dr. Samir Dalvie said that with change in era, private institutes are also doing good work who do have DNB students and they should also be given chance to present their work as we have accepted that the patients need not be physically present always during a clinical meet. He said that we should support such Institute for showcasing their work. Dr. Vikas Agashe pointed out that everybody should get a chance as DNB is also considered at par with MS degree. Dr. Rujuta Mehta pointed out that in the last year, JJ had 2 clinical meetings. Dr. Mohan Desai said that the applications were discussed in the EC and then finalized. Dr. Ram Chaddha said that we should have at least two major colleges every year in the list. Dr. Gautam Zaveri said that the clinical meeting in JJ Hospital was excellent and had very good cases. This year, there will be a slight change in format at clinical meet at Bombay Hospital and Hinduja Hospital. He said that the clinical meeting attendance is falling and there was a brainstorming in the EC after which a suggestion had come for a pilot project at Bombay Hospital clinical meet. The first half will be like a normal clinical meeting while the second half would contain four tables with senior faculty who would have topics on spine, knee, trauma and include saw bone workshop. He said that the clinical meets should be named after Dr. K. V. Chaubal. Dr. A. R. Karkhanis suggested that after the meeting we can call a specialist of a given field to take a topic for delegates. Dr. Sangeet Gawhale suggested that more time should be given to outside host Institute cases and we should give a prize for the best outside host Institute case. Dr. Vikas Agashe said that the format of the meeting can be decided by the convener. Dr. Ashish Phadnis suggested that even completed cases with good take home message should be allowed. Dr. Gautam Zaveri said that literature review should be given adequate time.

Dr. P. K. Mullaferoze Best Clinical Meeting for the year 2024-2025 was given to Jupiter Hospital where the convener was Dr. Milind Patil. The award was received by Dr. V. T. Ingalthalikar, Dr. Ashish Phadnis and Dr. Parag Lad on their behalf.

It was proposed by Dr. A. R. Karkhanis and seconded by Dr. V. T. Ingalthalikar.

## **10. TO RATIFY THE VARIOUS COURSE CONVENERS AS PER THE APPLICATIONS RECEIVED AS PER THE EC RECOMMENDATIONS (APPLICATION FORMS AND NAME OF COURSE ATTACHED)**

Dr. Rajesh Gandhi said that there was a suggestion to conduct Ilizarov + JESS course together. He would communicate with Dr. Mangal Parihar for the same. Dr. Divya Ahuja and Dr. Ajit Chalak will be instructed by the Secretary to discuss with Dr. Rajesh Gandhi regarding combining the 2 courses. Dr. V. T. Ingalthalikar pointed out that there are three times more people outside than inside the AGM. For better running of the society, the members should be forced to attend the AGM. The secretary informed that they have received two applications for trauma, spine and arthroplasty courses while the shoulder and elbow course was to be combined as the single course. Pediatric Orthopaedics and Ilizarov course received one application is each. The course conveners have agreed amongst themselves to be convener and co-convener for most of the courses. Dr. Vikas Agashe enquired if there was no competition amongst all applicants. Dr. Gautam Zaveri informed that Dr. Rohan Gala had applied for spine course but later withdrew his application and consented in favor of Dr. Jairam Jagiasi and Dr. Siddharth Shah under convenership of Dr. Gautam Zaveri. In Pediatric Orthopaedics Course, Dr. Chintan Doshi is the co-convener while in Shoulder course, Dr. Mihir Patel is the co-convener. For hand, Dr. Bipin Gangurde is Convener and Dr. Prashant Kamble is co-convener. The Foot and Ankle course will be done by Dr. Pradeep Moonot.

Dr. J. C. Taraporawala PG teaching course will be conducted by Dr. Binoti Sheth. Dr. A. R. Karkhanis complimented Dr. Binoti Sheth for doing a very good job with the JCT clinics. Dr. Gautam Zaveri complimented Dr. A. R. Karkhanis for his dedication to the JCT PG training course. He proposed travel privileges of pick up and drop for Dr. A. R. Karkhanis.

It was proposed by Dr. Harshad Argekar and seconded by Dr. Sunil Shahane

## **11. RATIFICATION OF DR. R. J. KATRAK ORATOR AND DR. K. T. DHOLAKIA EPONYMOUS LECTURER OF WIROC 2026 WHO WILL BE STANDBY FOR WIROC 2025**

Dr. Hemant Patankar is the confirmed speaker for Dr. R. J. Katrak Oration for WIROC 2025 and Dr. Sudhir Warrier is the confirmed speaker for WIROC 2026 who will be stand by for WIROC 2025. Dr. Vikas Khanduja whose name was discussed by the Orations committee will be considered for discussion next year as the mandate of the orations committee is to provide for standby speaker of 2025 only, as pointed out by Dr. Samir Dalvie. Dr. Gautam Zaveri said that people from Mumbai should be given a preference for Dr. R. J. Katrak Oration which was concurred by Dr. Roshan Wade. Dr. Vikas Agashe said that the third speaker in the list should not be contacted as it does not reflect well on the society if he is not chosen. Dr. Aseem Parekh said that earlier the GBM used to suggest and pass the name of the speaker which has changed now. Dr. S. S. Mohanty said that as per the decision in previous GBM, it has been decided to make a committee of five presidents which would suggest the name and that will be given to the GBM for approval. Dr. Samir Dalvie said that members can send their suggestions by email to the Secretary after which the committee will propose 2 to 3 names to the GBM. Dr. Neeraj Bijlani said that the committee should decide the names as decided by the GBM. Dr. Sunil Shahane said that the names previously suggested during the GBM were present for the GBM and this created an awkward situation when the GBM had to decide or disapprove their name in their presence. Dr. Samir Dalvie said that the names were vetted by the committee and then suggested to the GBM for voting. Dr. Rajan Walawalkar asked about the payment done for the expenses to call for the speakers to which the Secretary replied that we provide travel and local hospitality to them. The Dr. K. T. Dholakia Eponymous Lecturer for WIROC 2025 is Dr. Rajeev Soman. We have three names for WIROC 2026, they are Dr. Geoff Richards from Davos Switzerland working in development of Titanium plates and basic biomechanical research with the AO Research Institute and is the chief of the AORI, Dr. Kai Nan An from Mayo clinic working in field of Biomechanics and a very influential researcher with articles that have impacted orthopaedic practice and Dr. In Ho Joen from South Korea working in Shoulder and Elbow basic science research. Their brief CVs were displayed for more information to the members. Dr. Rajesh Gandhi said that it is difficult to find non-Orthopaedic surgeons for basic Sciences lectures and Orthopaedic surgeons who do good work in basic Sciences should be allowed to deliver the lecture. Dr. A. J. Thakur pointed out that non-Orthopaedic surgeons doing work in field of basic Sciences related to Orthopaedics are the ones who should be giving the lectures. Dr. Amit Ajgaonkar said that people from fields of Rheumatology, Infectious diseases can also give the lecture. Dr. Samir Dalvie said that they are already a part of the WIROC program where people from non-Orthopaedic

fields are given lectures. Dr. Ram Chaddha said that the lectures should add to the knowledge of general Orthopaedic surgeon and should help in our routine Orthopaedic practice. He suggested that once in every 3 years, we should have rotation in fields of Endocrinology, Artificial Intelligence, Infections, Rheumatology and Basic Science research out of which one year we can have an international speaker. Dr. S. S. Mohanty said that remuneration for international speakers should not come in the way of selecting good speakers. Dr. Sangeet Gawhale asked if there is any official protocol for this. Dr. Mohan Desai and Dr. Rujuta Mehta said that we should expand the scope of Dr. K. T. Dholakia Lecture and allow Orthopaedic surgeons to give the same. Dr. Amit Ajgaonkar suggested that once we have such a speaker, we should utilize him in multiple panels during WIROC. Dr. A. J. Thakur pointed out that there might be a bias if the person giving the lecture is an Orthopaedic surgeon. Dr. Roshan Wade said that there should be no conflict of interest and the company logo should not be included during their lecture. It was decided by a show of hands that Dr. In Ho Jeon would be the first choice and invited for the KT Dholakia Oration for 2026 WIROC and standby for 2025. Dr. Kai Nan An or Dr. Geoff Richards will be contacted if Dr. Jeon refuses or isn't willing to come.

It was proposed by Dr. Sachin Kale and seconded by Dr. S. S. Mohanty.

## **12. WIROC 2024 REPORT: DR. ANOOP DHAMANGAONKAR AND DR. DHIRAJ SONAWANE**

The WIROC secretaries presented their report which highlighted various new initiatives like WIROC premier league, pre WIROC webinars, fellowship opportunities for budding Orthopaedic surgeons, various debates and newly introduced bullet cases during WIROC 2024. They handed over a cheque of profit of Rupees 50 lakhs to the BOS. Dr. Vikas Agashe said that it is a very challenging job to get the speakers early and prepare the program accordingly.

It was proposed by Dr. Satish Mutha and seconded by Dr. Parag Lad.

## SUMMARY

I am grateful to the Bombay Orthopaedic Society for granting me this Arthroplasty Fellowship at KEM Hospital, Mumbai, under the mentorship of Prof. Dr. Mohan Desai. This fellowship provided invaluable exposure to complex primary and revision hip reconstructions, together with insights into advanced knee arthroplasty techniques.

## KEY SURGICAL & CLINICAL EXPOSURE

**Hip Arthroplasty:** Complex primaries and revision cases involving bone defects, extended trochanteric osteotomy, and use of augments and modular stems.

**Knee Arthroplasty:** Wide case mix focusing on deformity correction, gap balancing vs measured resection, alignment philosophies (mechanical, kinematic, restricted kinematic), and observation of robotic-assisted TKR.
